General Information

Coombe Bissett Down Nature Reserve is located south-west of the city of Salisbury.

The site is managed by Wiltshire Wildlife Trust.

The reserve encompasses rolling downland, steep slopes and a dry valley.

Part of the reserve has been designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) because of the rare flora and fauna found here.

The site is 70 hectares.

There is limited access for wheelchairs or pushchairs.

There are no toilet facilities on site.

Getting there

The reserve can be accessed by car and buses go to Coombe Bissett village.
Visit www.salisburyreds.co.uk for more information.

Travelling from Salisbury on the A354 to Blandford, at Coombe Bissett take first turn left after Fox and Goose pub signposted Homington. After about 0.5 miles turn right into Pennings Drove. Follow the road uphill for 0.25 miles.

The main reserve entrance and car park is on the right. It is slightly hidden and there is no signage.

The car park has space for about 7 vehicles. There are no accessible parking bays.

There is signage and a site map in the car park.

There are 5 entrance points to the reserve in total but we advise using the main entrance. This is the only entrance with a car park.

Exploring Coombe Bissett

Enter the reserve through the kissing gate.

The reserve is steep in places and the path is grass.

There are 4 different walking trails you can take during your visit:

- Easy Access Trail
- Short Loop
- Hillside Loop
- Valley Loop

The trails are waymarked throughout the site.

Easy Access Trail

The Easy Access Trail is advised for those with limited mobility.

Follow the flat path to the end of the reserve until you reach the farm and then loop back.

Here you will see stunning views over the valley.

Distance: 1.2km / 0.7 miles

Allow: 20 minutes

Short Loop

The Short Loop is slightly steep in places.

There are several kissing gates throughout the trail.

Here you will walk past the flower-rich banks.

Distance: 2km / 1.2 miles

Allow: 30 minutes

Hillside Loop

The Hillside Loop is steep in places and some of the paths are narrow.

There are several kissing gates throughout the trail.

The trail has benches with view points overlooking the reserve.

Look out for the butterfly bank on the Hillside Loop.

Distance: 3.2km / 2 miles

Allow: 1 hour

Valley Loop

The Valley Loop takes you to the bottom of the site.

There are several kissing gates throughout the trail.

You may see our flock of hardy Herdwick sheep and herd of light-footed Dexter cattle, which are moved on and off the land to provide conservation grazing.

There are benches along the route with view points over the reserve.

Please note dogs are not allowed on the valley bottom during lambing season.

Distance: 3.2km / 2 miles

Allow: 1 hour
